Minister of Children and Family Services join us, collectively building awareness of the shared history that shapes our present and future.





Diana cares for herself to better care for Artemis

Diana and Artemis first connected with Norwood Centre when they were invited by a Norwood facilitator at the library.

They attended Parent and Child Groups and accessed the Parent Respite Program. However, Diana still wasn't receiving the support she needed from her family.

"There's two types of loneliness that I experienced. There's one as a postpartum mom who's completely reliant on strangers. And that can be very lonely and scary. And then there's also the loneliness that comes with being with family, but they're constantly rejecting you."

Eventually, she moved into her own apartment but continued to struggle with mental health.

"I remember Artemis was screaming constantly while I was trying to give him a bath," she recalled. She hadn't slept for days and she couldn't handle it. "I stood up, I turned off the lights while he was in the tub, and I slammed the door."

She told her Family Support Worker about the incident. Recognizing that it was part of a larger pattern of struggle, together they called Child and Family Services. The fear of Artemis being taken away was unbearable, but the woman







on the phone was kind and understanding.

Artemis went for temporary overnight respite care for a few days while Diana spent time taking care of herself. When she got Artemis back, she was functioning much better.

"I was able to smile and enjoy his presence instead of dreading the responsibility that came with it."

Diana started seeing a counsellor for her mental health

and found a daycare for Artemis to prioritize taking care of herself.

Ten months later, Diana is focused on her relationship with her son. Together they use the Kimochis tool to communicate their emotions and do developmental activities based on his interests. Diana role models and practices the behaviours she wants to see in Artemis.



INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

To the Members of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre

The accompanying summary financial statements of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre, which comprise the summary statement of financial position as at December 31, 2024 and the summary statement of revenue and expenditures for the year then ended, are derived from the audited financial statements of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre for the year ended December 31, 2024. We expressed a qualified opinion on those financial statements in our report dated March 18, 2025.

The summary financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. Reading the summary financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, the summary financial statements derived from the audited financial statements of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre for the year ended December 31, 2024, are a fair summary of those financial statements. However, the summary financial statements are misstated to the equivalent extent as the audited financial statements of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre for the year ended December 31, 2024.

We expressed a qualified audit opinion on the audited statements in our report dated March 18, 2025. The basis of our qualified audit was that in common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Centre derives revenue from fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit evidence. Our qualified audit opinion states that, except for the effects of the described matter, those financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Norwood Child & Family Resource Centre as at December 31, 2024 in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit Organizations (ASNPO).

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Summary Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the summary audited financial statements in accordance with ASNPO.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Summary Financial Statements

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summarized financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standard (CAS) 810, *Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements.*
